T³: Today's Teaching Tip Students' Ethical development*

- As teaching involves building characters as well as providing competent learners and professionals, academics have a responsibility to build into their teaching opportunities for discussing ethical decision making.
- To encourage student exploration of ethical behaviour, <u>Miriam Rosalyn</u>
 <u>Diamond, PhD</u> have utilized (a) entire courses focused on ethics, (b) lessons within a larger course, and (c) training sessions for student leadership roles.
- Within a unit, each student can determine the format for their individual project. Some may submit traditional papers, while others may present the information in creative and visual formats.
- At a program level, academics can challenge students to grapple with ethical issues throughout a particular course. For example, in one of M. R. Diamond's Organizational Psychology class, students were invited to raise and question ethical aspects of all topics under discussion, including the hiring process, job training, motivating employees, and providing performance feedback.
- Further, workshops can be offered that prepare students for specific roles. Through discussions of specific predicaments participants may consider situations they are likely to face.
